


MLI Summer 2021 Project Document Reclaiming Community and Connection Post-Covid



"There is no going back to pre-Covid times. There is only forward – to a new and uncertain future that is currently presenting us with an opportunity for thoughtful design." – Amy Edmondson, Harvard Business School

Our Summer 2021 MLI project is predicated on the knowledge that it will be difficult, if not impossible, to "go back to normal" in terms of the student experience on grounds when *fully half our* undergraduate students never will have been on grounds for a fully in-person class, and will *have no idea* what a pre-covid "normal" UVA experience looks like. College educators across the country, and we here at UVA across grounds, must grapple with how to (re)create college communities post-covid. *Here, and in collab, are an HBR & a NYT article* about the return to "normal" post-pandemic.

Your experiences at UVA, pre-covid, during covid, and now hopefully post-covid, make you *experts* on The University student experience. What makes *you* feel connected to a broader UVA community? What memories epitomize, for you, a shared UVA experience? What makes UVA students or alumni spontaneously yell "Wahoo Wah" at the mere sight of a UVA insignia across a crowded airport concourse (no doubt troubling security)?

The MLI Summer Project for 2021 asks you to use your expertise in the student experience to help UVA add, change, or re-envision pivotal elements of the student experience in order to provide a foundation from which all students can build strong community connection and joy-filled educational and social memories of UVA.

Programs and traditions, arise, hold sway, and fade as the needs of the students and of the institution change. Covid, perhaps more than any other event since the admission to UVA of minorities in the 1950s & 60sand then women in 1970—the Covid pandemic is a disruption significant enough to break open opportunities for thoughtful *re-design* of what "we have always done."

- How can we reclaim—or define—that <u>joy</u> of a UVA, on-grounds, educational experience?
- What can UVA "be" or "do" to build strong bonds in our community after the "absences" of the pandemic?
- How do we improve majors, housing, grounds, etc. to build community when we've not been in community?
- What type of experiences or structures will create a deep sense of belonging and togetherness for us all?
- What was a pre-pandemic quintessential UVA experience? Why? To what purpose?
- What was a quintessential "In the time of Covid" UVA experience? Why? With what effect?
- Which existing structures or traditions can UVA leverage to better effect or discontinue altogether?
- What GOOD things came out of the pandemic, and how do we leverage those elements?
- How do CIOs recommit to community in the coming year? Are there ways to be more collaborative?
- Where would you <u>locate</u> the changes you might propose? Programming? CIOs? Housing? Student self-governance? Facilities? Administrative, Student, Staff and Faculty engagement? others?
- Why & how would your proposed ideas meet student needs or improve student experiences? support or improve student experiences, or speak to a need you identify?
- What high expectations should we set for our UVA/Charlottesville Community in a post-pandemic world?

We suggest that your proposals aim for maximum positive impact. Propose changes the school would want to continue beyond fall 2021 and that, ideally, would become standing expectations or traditions for students in the years to come. For example, there was a time when Summer Orientation at UVA didn't exist as we know it. The Summer Orientation Program was once a truly revolutionary idea that is now a shared cultural landmark for how students are introduced to UVA it continues successfully a decade later. What revolutionary ideas (not orientation please) might your group develop to cultivate students' overall sense of belonging to a broader UVA community on grounds and world-wide?

We're asking you to take on the <u>same problem</u> the rest of the University is struggling with at this time. and to come up with proposals for: How the University can use the pandemic supplied break *positively* to rethink and to re-build community. How do we identify the traditions that sustained us and those we learned to question? How do all the voices of UVA's community come together to create the positive UVA memories we'll all hold & enjoy later?

"College in a pandemic was not the experience that most students had in mind. But at year's end, some see positive experiences and insights that came out of it."—<u>NYT, 5.22.21</u>

While it's tempting to start generating ideas immediately, or to rush in and identify "positive experiences," first we'd like you to look back. It's vital to your project's success that you understand students' experiences at UVA and their experience of Covid are *far* from monolithic. To parse and then engage with those differences, we'd like you to do just a bit of pre-work before our class discussion on Thursday May 27th:

Step 1: Individually before class on 5/27, *briefly* list 1-2 responses for each of the following:

Summer 2019 and your first 6 months in person on grounds

- o What did you expect or anticipate about UVA before you arrived on grounds in Fall 2019?
- o What did you wonder about most before you arrived on grounds?
- o How did UVA meet—or not meet—your expectations during your first semester?
- o What were some memorable highlights of your fist 6 months on Grounds?
- o What group events or interactions are most memorable?
- o How did you meet your first friend?
- o Whom did you turn to for advice about academic life? Social life? All things "UVA"?
- What did it feel like sitting in your first-year classes?
- What was it that helped build connections among your room-, hall-, or dorm-mates?
- o What's important for students new to Grounds to experience in the Summer/Fall of 2021?

February 2020, Covid, campus shut down, UVA's move to primarily on-line instruction

- o How did you experience the two weeks when UVA shut down? (March 2020)
- o Where did you spend the second half of the spring 2020 semester while taking class on line?
- o What had you expected to do during summer of 2020? What did you do?
- o Where, and how, did you attend classes in the fall of 2020 and the spring of 2021?
 - i. Where were you living?
 - ii. Who were you living with?
 - iii. Did you stay with the same group all year?
- Which elements of this Covid year affected you, your family, and/or your education most?
- What approaches to learning or working with others did you discover during the pandemic that you want to continue?

Think deeply, list your most authentic and insightful experiences, be ready to listen well to others' and to share your own experiences.

Step 2: In class on Thursday 5/27

- In your small groups, share your responses about your first semester at UVA.
- In your small groups, share what your pandemic reality was like and its impact.

Step 3: In class on Thursday 5/27

• As a full group—discuss patterns of similarity and difference across what you've discussed in your small groups.

With Elgin Cleckley, you learned to develop big ideas, test them, and propose methods to implement them. In this the second phase of MLI, we ask you to employ all of your many skills, and to learn more, as you propose innovative, revolutionary ways for UVA to "Reclaim Community and Connection Post-Covid."

Propose your ideas via project deliverable formats and protocols specified in this document

We'll post a copy of the project document to the MLI collab site and via email. We'll also post readings, videos, and other reference materials to COLLAB. Check the collab site (& your UVA email!) *frequently* for newly uploaded material.

Our MLI approach to projects is all about collaborative groups

For the MLI project, you're expected to propose viable ideas that speak to our core purpose. As you've learned, real-world projects often require you to work in **groups or teams** to best leverage strengths as you tackle the challenge you're set. In the MLI Summer Program, you'll work in **groups of five on the project.** You'll find a list of project groups in **Exhibit 1** of the project document. (Yes, if you're reading this in class, go ahead and turn to **Exhibit 1** now.)

You have 4 project deliverables for the MLI summer project Reclaiming Community and Connection Post-Covid

You will share your work at different stages and in various formats over the course of the next 5 weeks. The important thing is to start early with your investigation, ideation, and surveys of prime audiences or clients for your ideas. You'll receive more specific guidance on each deliverable in our daily sessions; info about the first pitch is included below.

While the dates are likely set, times may change, you should keep up to date with weekly schedules and changes announced via email. Check your virginia.edu email and our collab site for updates. MLI is unpredictable!

You'll focus your ideas on the student experience; but, your final audience are UVA decision makers

Your audience for the project is the University's key decision makers at all levels, starting with Pres. Ryan. It's essential that your ideas are able to be widely adopted by the diverse audiences of UVA. Take care to be inclusive as you identify all major stakeholders, not just students, when imagining the implications of returning to Grounds. Note that you will have several opportunities in the early weeks of the program to meet with stakeholder groups who are also tackling these questions. You'll want to prepare questions to ask during each panel of alumni, students, University staff or University administrators. Make the most of the unprecedented MLI access to decision makers to strengthen your ideas.

As you work, keep in mind basic questions necessary for most projects. How can you bring your design thinking skills, tools, and technologies to bear in understanding the problem? What specific disciplinary approaches unique to your majors might help you to think through the project problem and solution? Again, here are some questions to help get you started. (IMP- the lists of questions in the project document are not, we repeat, not a "check list" for the project deliverable, nor should you in any way structure the project deliverables sequentially around these initial questions.)

- How do you create connection and community when you haven't been in diverse connection or community for the past 18 months?
- How do you envision the college experience after covid?
- What do you need and how do you get it?
- What do returning students need, and how do we help them get it?
- You don't have to envision something completely new—you can re-create, or fix, the old.

- How do you understand the problem? What are its most important elements?
- Why do your specific ideas make sense and whom do those ideas need to persuade?
- Who has the power to grant your proposal?
- How will you create persuasive recommendations that are neither too extensive nor too narrow?
- What policies, programs, and/or stakeholder communities will your proposed changes affect?
- What is your proposal's *ideal* outcome?

As with any proposal, you'll also want to keep in mind the costs, both in *funding and in time*, to implement your ideas.

Pay attention to key decision makers and the people vital to implement your ideas

Keep the audience of key decision makers in mind as you frame your research and as you create each of the deliverables for the MLI Project. You will succeed in your project if you develop a clear understanding of what matters to all stakeholders. What matters to the multiple decision makers in your audience who will listen to, consider, and who are responsible for implementing your ideas? Identify potential pushback on your ideas as well.

The MLI "RCCPC" Project requires you to share your ideas and support one another

You'll be asked to provide short, group or individually written or orally presented "mini-deliverables" about elements of your project or the program in class throughout the summer. These mini "deliverables" will be done & due during sessions (or immediately thereafter). Participation, not preparation, will be needed. Essentially, you'll need to be able to answer the question, "where are you on your project" with specificity whenever asked.

Since you're familiar with design thinking approaches and Miro Software, we're also scheduling a review of Empathetic Design Thinking methodology with UVA and MLI alumna, Lauren Brown; time and date TBD, but likely in the early weeks of the program. In that session, no doubt, you'll be sharing your ideas.

Your first *official* deliverable is due on <u>Friday, June 11th</u> during our class session from 10:30-12:30. At that time each group will give a **3-4 min**. briefing to MLI faculty on your project ideas and progress. We'll then have 5-6 min. of Q&A and advice *from* the audience. You'll use **6-7** preliminary slides (more on this in class), and in a **concise**, persuasive manner each group will present its <u>working</u> ideas, progress and key insights. In addition, feel free to ask questions you'd like input on in relation to your project, resources, key decision makers, etc.

Please follow specifications closely as you develop your Proposal Client Deck.

Among your final deliverables will be a client deck of approximately **25 slides**, with additional exhibit or appendix slides—no more than seven, in which you share your final proposal. The client deck is just one, tangible, portable document administrators can access during future discussions around the topic.

Please submit the client deck portion of your project both electronically and in print format to the MLI faculty by **Monday 6-28-21** between **4:00-5:00pm** so that we can make it available to audience members prior to your group presentations.

The order, scope, design style, and emphasis with which you present your comprehensive plan for your proposal will, naturally, vary across groups. You will want to make sure that your deck: clearly states the reasons for any proposed changes, explores in sufficient depth which problem(s) you're solving for the University through your proposed changes, and provides a detailed, *well-researched*, logically organized, elegantly articulated and *persuasive argument* in support of your proposed ideas.

Once you've finished the Client deck, you'll build presentation slides and present for 30 min.

The final component of the MLI Project allows you to share your work with your peers and the public in a professional and persuasive manner that aligns with the way in which traditional organizations (including the University) vet new ideas. Each group will have a **30 min.** time slot within our 10:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m. window on Thursday July 1st.

Your public presentations will use a group presentation format. While you should plan for **15 minutes** of presented content and **15 minutes** of discussion and Q&A, you are free to bring in prototypes, mock ups, videos, interactive components, or any other materials you believe will help the audience visualize your ideas. Your goal is to help the audience envision and experience your proposal in a compelling manner. <u>Everyone</u> in your group should have an opportunity to present and speak before the gathered audience.

The audience will consist of your peers, your MLI faculty, invited key stakeholders and decision makers. The goal is—quite literally—to persuade the stakeholder audience to see the value of, and adopt, your ideas. Again, you have the opportunity to improve the way we build, maintain, and conceptualize community on grounds and indeed the nature of a UVA education, for current and future generations of students.

You'll receive more detailed explanations for, and instruction about, how to prepare each deliverable as we proceed through the institute.
